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


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Analysis of feedback from various stakeholders -2023-24

The institution is affiliated to the Karnataka State Law University, Hubballi. The Institution follows the curriculum prescribed by the University. The institution collectsfeedback through Google Forms from students, teachers, alumni, and employers and provides a comprehensive insight into the curriculum's strengths and areas for improvement. Below is an analysis based on the responses received:

1. Students' Perspective

Students highlighted the 'curriculum's theoretical foundation as robust, offering a deep understanding of legal principles. However, many expressed the need for greater emphasis on practical learning through moot courts, internships, and case study analyses. Students recommended the inclusion of emerging legal topics such as Artificial Intelligence and Data Protection Laws, reflecting contemporary legal challenges. Some feedback also pointed out the need for reducing redundancy in the syllabus and adopting a more interdisciplinary approach.

2. Teachers' Perspective

Teachers appreciated the curriculum's alignment with the Bar Council of India's guidelines and its focus on foundational legal principles. However, they suggested revising certain outdated topics to include global legal trends and comparative law perspectives. Many faculty members emphasized the need for continuous curriculum updates to keep pace with legal advancements. They also advocated for the integration of digital tools and e-learning resources to enhance teaching and learning experiences.

3. Alumni's Perspective

Alumni responses provided a valuable post-graduation perspective, highlighting how well the curriculum prepared them for the professional world. While most alumni credited the university for their strong legal acumen, they noted a gap in practical skills, particularly in areas such as client counselling, drafting legal documents, and courtroom procedures. They suggested introducing specialized elective courses and fostering partnerships with law firms and NGOs for hands-on experience.

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4. Employers' Perspective

Employers emphasized the need for graduates to possess strong analytical and problem-solving skills alongside theoretical knowledge. While they acknowledged the competence of university graduates, they recommended incorporating skill-based training, such as negotiation techniques, alternative dispute resolution methods, and legal research. Employers also stressed the importance of enhancing soft skills like communication, teamwork, and adaptability to meet industry expectations.

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


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Analysis of feedback from various stakeholders 2023-24

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
